Pimp LONDON

"When you're a loner, there's a kind of perverse joy, inner joy." The words of Robert Beck, better known as one of the most controversial of African American authors -Iceberg Slim. Slim's novels, most famously, Pimp, are energetic depictions of his in the burgeoning black life as a procurer of women power movement

from the 1930s to the 1960s, complete with glossaries explaining contemporary street slang, phrases such as "pull your coat" (teach) and "bottom woman" (a pimp's top whore). His work was an instant hit, although many

distanced themselves from him, seeing him as an exploiter. To celebrate the publication of a new edition of Pimp by Canongate Books, poetry collective Apples And Snakes has commissioned seven performance poets including Jean "Binta" Breeze and Mat Fraser to
